Letter from the Co-President

Dear Quilters,

I recently had the pleasure of attending a BSO concert at Symphony Hall. I really enjoy classical music, especially the works of the old masters such as Bach, Mozart and Beethoven. I'm especially drawn to composers of what's considered the Romantic Era such as Tchaikovsky, Mendelssohn, Shubert and Dvorak, to name a few.

This performance featured a serenade by Brahms, and two pieces by Shumann - a piano concerto and then his rousing Symphony #4. I was struck by the similar elements between the performance of an orchestra and the creation of a quilt. The serenade was performed by a small orchestra on stage (no timpani, trumpets or trombones). Many more musicians joined the orchestra for the concerto, along with a piano. (The conductor played the piano and conducted at the same time, something I've never seen in person before and it's quite a feat.) The piano was removed for the last piece. This movement of instruments and staging reminded me of how some quilts are made with a limited palette of colors and textures, others may have a larger palette along with an accent piece around which it is built, while many quilts mix various colors, textures and fabrics, not to mention embellishments.

With an orchestral piece the end results are a feast for the ears, while we know that quilts provide a feast for the eyes. Like orchestral pieces or really any music, quilts can evoke various emotions that stir your heart, from sadness to joy, and fill you with wonder.

Ready to submit? The quilt submission forms will be available on-line in January. Paper forms will also be available. To submit a quilt, you will need to know its size to the nearest inch. Please be as accurate as possible.

Block of the Month

December BOM Preview

We're ready to step it up a notch with the December BOM --- the spiky leaf! It's the same technique as we have used before but more pieces, so a bit more time-consuming.

Take some inspiration from Diana's example below --- she made hers with 3 fabrics – the background, the left side leaves and the right side leaves. But have fun with the colors that work for you and if you'd prefer a single fabric for all of the leaves, go for it!


As for the fabric cutting directions, Diana recommends that for the first piece, A1, cut a strip of fabric 2' x 2". The remainder of the pieces can also be cut 2" x 2", so that you don't need to measure for length in cutting individual rectangles. Once you have sewn in the leaf strip, you can cut it off and use the rest for the next piece of that color. After A1, you actually only need strips cut to 1 3/4" x 1 3/4" for the remainder of the block. But note that the 2" x 2" size gives you some extra wiggle room for those who are new to or rusty at paper-piecing.

We're looking forward to seeing everyone's November daffodils at the QQ holiday party! We will have printouts of the spiky leaf available for everyone who wants them. As always, reach out to Diana or Amy with your construction questions.




6-inch block, not to scale

Library News



Since that is the focus of this year's block-of-the-month challenge, I thought this would be a good month to highlight a few of those titles. You can find the whole list on our <u>Library Thing</u> <u>catalog</u> by clicking on "Your Books" in the top tool bar, then "tags" in the second tool bar, and finally "paper piecing" in the list of tags.

Paper Piece the Quick Strip Way, Peggy Martin




"This book is designed to help the student learn to design and rapidly piece relatively complex blocks that you have probably admired in other quilts and wondered how to make. What I find most interesting about this book is Martin's approach to designing blocks so that they can be chain pieced; this makes for more rapid construction of the quilt. She calls this method 'quick strip paper piecing,' and it really is like strip piecing except that you are using a paper foundation. The patterns in the book are gorgeous and she has interpreted them in lots of unusual fabrics, which make them even more interesting. The book will definitely help you improve your designing and paper piecing skills." (Amazon.com review)

The Splendid Sampler 2, Pat Sloan & Jane Davidson

"More than 28,000 quilters have sewn along with the Splendid Sampler community online. Now Pat Sloan and Jane Davidson return with 100 all-new block patterns to inspire quilters all over the world, all over again!" As in the first book, the finished block size is 6 inches so all blocks can be easily combined. (Amazon.com)

If you didn't complete your project last month, continue to work on it and bring it to the December meeting. Remember! Every completed project earns you a raffle entry for the drawing at the end of the challenge in May!

It isn't too late! If you are just joining the challenge, don't worry, the UFO/NSY chart is available here. Check back to the September, October and November newsletters for information and tips to get UFO Busting!

The random project number drawn for December is 1! During the month of December, work on the project that corresponds with 1st project on your list! (If you opted for a "Free" project, choose a project on your list that you want to get a jumpstart on or continue working on the previous months' projects #7 or #3.)

Here is this month's tip from Pat Sloan: December is designated as "Search and Rescue"

It is VERY important to ask yourself these questions:

- When was the last time you actually **SAW** the top of your cutting table
- Is your ironing board piled **HIGH** with crap that needs put away.. .. treasures you purchased?
- Do you HAVE your newly selected UFO/NSYs in a spot where you can actually GET to them?
- Where are your Scissors, rotary cutter, favorite Ruler, needles and thread (pick one ..or all!)
- Can you just SIT DOWN and sew at ANY time? Or is the machine covered in projects that you have to move
- Do you have a project 'at the ready' and what is it in? No it does not count if it is in a box under the bed in other room

Your assignment

- Identify THREE organization things that make it HARD for you to get to work
- Now FIX THEM (yes clear off that ironing board and KEEP it clear!)
- Reward yourself when that is done
- Share your finished project at the December meeting!



International Quilt Festival in Houston




