Dear Quilters.

New Year's Resolutions and Your Brain

Here we are at the start of a new year, and a new decade. So, what wonderful resolutions have you made? Perhaps you've decided to sew at least 3 hours every day (even though you work full-time, have a household to run, etc.), finish 4 quilts by the QQ show at the end of March, *really* organize your sewing area, or even sort and purge your entire stash. And on top of that perhaps you have vowed to lose the 10 pounds you gained over the holidays and then another 10 that would return you to closer to your youthful figure. So, to lose that weight you will renew that sports fitness club membership and go to the gym every day. Right?

So, what's wrong with these commendable resolutions? Why do 80% of those who make New Year's resolutions (65% of us) abandon them by mid-February, if not sooner?

As I mentioned in my September co-president message, I have been writing a book, for some time, on Brain Health and Resilience. In the book I have a section devoted to our Expectations and Belief systems. I think that New Year's resolutions clearly fall into the category of "great expectations." Much of what we believe about ourselves and the world around us comes from learned outcomes of things we have experienced. In large part, it is our *expectation* that largely determines the outcome. The problem comes when there is a mismatch between our expectations and reality. In other words, when we set unrealistic expectations, aka resolutions, we set ourselves up for failure. We chide ourselves when we do not

meet these Herculean standards, and our sense of self-worth may drop a notch or two. For some that may lead to a compensatory need for a piece of chocolate, or the like, for a quick dopamine boost of the reward system, but soon we feel guilty for having given in to the impulse and a downward spiral of emotions may begin.

So, how do we avoid the post-holiday blues and set more meaningful goals for the year? Many simply do not make New Year's resolutions, and maybe that's ok, too. However, the start of a new year does give us a sense that we get a fresh start, a chance to begin anew, and maybe we can make some changes that will be positive. It is a wonderful time to assess what is working in your life and what could use some improvement. Being truly grateful for what is right (and even listing those things) can be enlightening. Then, you could make a list of things that could be better (e.g. your stash really has gotten out of hand and you won't use it up if you live to 200!). Here, it may help to prioritize what really needs fixing and prioritize that--just pick one or two things. Then, using the honed skills of your frontal lobes (which I explain in the book) you can strategize and divide the project into manageable components (baby steps are key). By dividing the project into mini-increments, you can experience the joy of accomplishment—and should have a planned reward (preferably non-edible) for each phase. If you don't meet a particular target quite as expected, either alter your expectation or consider a different strategy for the next step (it is not a "failure" but a growth opportunity). The important thing is to be kind to yourself (not indulgent but accepting of your reality) and practice a positive outlook as you adapt to the ever-changing circumstances of your journey. Wishing you all a healthy and joyful new year, brimming with colorful fabrics, embellishments and creative ideas!

We've made a few changes, which you may have noticed if you've looked at your raffle quilt tickets. We decided to increase the entry donation to \$10. Also, we've changed the show hours. The show will be open from 10 - 5 each day. There were two reasons for this – it is helpful for internet publicity if the hours are the same each day, and we had very few people come during the late hours on Friday.

QQ member Cathy Clemens works with Needham High School students to make Comfort Quilts. The club is called "Mending Hearts" and meets on Fridays after school. We will be inviting the students to show some of the quilts they've created – we'll display them near our Comfort Quilts.

Block of the Month

QQ January Block of the Month

This month's BOM --- Small Palms – builds on last month's Spiky Leaf and the previous month's Daffodil (2 parts) patterns. We will have copies of the pattern at the next QQ meeting.

A couple of recommendations for fabric cutting. Cut a 2-3/4" x 14" strip of the background color for the large pieces on the sides (A13 and B12) and set aside for the end. For the rest of the pieces, I used 1-1/2" strips of each color (which was pretty generous – if you have narrower scraps that you want to use, that would be fine; just might take more careful placement).

The angles in this block are a little tricky as they jut out. Be sure to leave extra fabric on either side so that when you flip the fabric up, you have fully covered the section for that fabric piece (test this by folding the fabric up before pinning it in place).

And remember --- everyone who makes a block for this month gets a raffle ticket! Looking forward to seeing everyone's creations!



Pattern for "Small Palms" as 6,000 by 6,000 (inches) block in EQ8 Project "born diana amv" printed from EQ8!



One of the things I will be speaking about at our January meeting is quilt appraisal, so this month I am highlighting some of our QQ library books that focus on quilt history.



Barbara Brackman's Civil War Sampler: 50 Quilt Blocks with Stories from History




Barbara Brackman is the queen of quilt history. She has written many books on the subject, including the bible of all quilt appraisers, The Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns. This book "features fifty quilt blocks that commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Civil War. Each block (most were first published in the 1930s) was selected for the symbolism its name lends to recounting stories from the era's women. This compilation of quilt block patterns includes period photos and first-person accounts. Choose from pieced or appliquéd blocks, each in two colorways with instructions for 8" and 12" sizes." <u>Dear Jane: The Two Hundred and Twenty-Five Patterns from the 1863</u> <u>Jane A. Stickle Quilt,</u> Brenda Manges Papadakis

"Dear Jane contains all of the 225 patterns of the historic Jane Stickle 1863 quilt as well as a series of letters to Jane about life and times in the nineteenth century, with emphasis on the Civil War and the women's movement. Among the patterns and letters you will find a dozen quilts from the 1990s, all inspired by Jane's supreme example of quilt-making artistry in 1863." (Amazon.com)



Quilts 1700-2010: Hidden Histories, Untold Stories, Sue Prichard



"This groundbreaking book documents the fascinating history of quilt and patchwork production in Britain. The hidden histories and personal narratives of some of the most evocative objects in the Victoria &Albert Museum's collection are revealed, from the origins of the 'love poem' on the 'Chapman marriage coverlet' to the sources of inspiration for the intricately pieced pictorial 'George III coverlet.' Originally published to accompany a wildly popular V&A exhibition, this lavishly illustrated book presents quilt-making as much more than craft." (Amazon.com)

If you don't love the project, but love fabric that you have set aside... break up the set, give away the parts that are done and bust the rest back into your stash!


