Quinobequin Quilt Show 2020

The QQ 2020 Quilt Show is coming up on March 27 & 28th! I hope you are all thinking about what you want to finish before the show! I get asked a lot of questions about submitting quilts, so here are some guidelines.

- 1. Anyone who is a member in good standing of Quinobequin Quilters can submit quilts to the show. We would love to have 100% participation!
- 2. You can submit as many quilts as you like. We will ask you to number them, so that #1 will be the quilt that you most want to have in the show. If we run out of space (a good problem!) we will start to remove the higher numbered quilts.
- 3. Quilts must NOT have been shown in any previous QQ shows. Show 'N Tell does not count!
- 4. If you possess a quilt that you did not make yourself, it can also be in the show. For example, if friends helped with a group quilt, or if you found an antique quilt in your aunt's attic, these can be in the show.
- 5. You must be confident that the quilt will be finished (binding included you know who you are) AT LEAST 48 hours before we hang the show.
- 6. Most quilts will need handing sleeves we can show you how to attach a temporary sleeve with safety pins if need be.

Quinobequin Quilt Show 2020: Mini Quilts Fundraiser

Ever made a mini-quilt? As an additional way to raise funds at the auction, we invite members to sew mini-quilts (5"x 8") that will be for sale. These are easy to make and a great way to use up scraps. Representational fabrics are particularly good, although any fabrics will work to create this fun work of art.

All you need is a 5"x 8" piece of a heavy-duty stabilizer, some fusible and fabric. I use Pellon's fusible called Peltex that is fusible on one side. (You can also get it fusible on both sides.) I'll have cut pieces of it at the October meeting for anyone who would like some.

We'll also have supplies for making mini-quilts at the retreats for people who want to work on them there.

During the month of October, work on the project that corresponds with 7th project on your list! (If you opted for a "Free" project, choose a project on your list that you want to get a jumpstart on.)


October's tip is: Pick Some-




Block of the Month

While I was there, I was able to preview two recent publications that might appeal to our guild. Let me know if you are interested in having these added to the library's collection.

200 Years of Solid Color Quilts: A Quilt Study, American Quilt Study Group

"With all of the printed fabrics that have been available to quilters over the centuries, why are quilt makers drawn to solid color fabrics again and again? Bright and bold to soft and subdued, these quilts are graphic and timeless. Members of the American Quilt Study Group were challenged to study a solid color quilt created any time during the last 200 years and create a quilt inspired by the original. The inspiration quilts are varied and the resulting creations range from a near duplicate to a distant but certainly related relative." -- https://www.amazon.com/

Cotton and Thrift: Feed Sacks and the Fabric of American Households.

"Printed cotton sacks are currently fashionable aspects for material culture research, particularly in the costume and quilt history communities. In the second quarter of the twentieth century, these mass-produced sacks were relied upon by rural America as a valuable source of free fabric for clothing, quilts, and home décor. This book is the catalog for the Museum of Texas Tech University's "Cotton and Thrift" exhibition, which showcases the Pat L. Nickols Cotton Sack Research Collection."



Social Justice Sewing Academy Piecing together Youth Voices in a 21st Century Sewing Circle August 20 - December 1, 2019

The Social Justice Sewing Academy brings hands-on workshops to schools and youth organizations, facilitating and inspiring young people to express their concerns, hopes, and ideas through art. The powerful imagery they create in cloth tells their stories. The quilt blocks are then embellished, embroidered, and sewn together by volunteers around the world. The finished quilts on loan to the New England Quilt Museum are genuine, poignant, and powerful.







A Tribute to Sue Garman September 11 – December 29, 2019

The New England Quilt Museum is proud to celebrate the lifetime achievement of the late

master quiltmaker, Sue Garman. Thanks to the generosity of her family, this retrospective exhibition features 37 of Garman's original designs.

Sue Garman made more than 300 quilts over 40 years, nearly all of them original. Her excellence was recognized with numerous awards in prestigious quilt competitions, while she also advanced a career at NASA. She retired as Associate Director for the Johnson Space Center in Houston, TX in 2014. Her skill in mathematics and appreciation for detail are visible in her meticulous applique and intricately pieced quilts.

Suspended The Fabric Sculptures of Priscilla Sage September 11 – December 29, 2019

Priscilla Sage's brilliant, light, free-hanging fabric sculptures are conceptual studies of form, light, and space. Their radiant colors derive from mastery of disperse dyes and direct painting on silver mylar fabrics. "Although I work on a large scale, my inspiration comes from the structure of natural forms that can be as small as mosses, as sinuous as the DNA helix, as vast as images from the Hubbel telescope, or as personal as the human body. The underlying theme of my sculpture is the relationship of humans and nature." Priscilla Sage is associate professor emerita of art and design at Iowa State University's College of Design.

Quilt artist, Sue Bleiweiss, explores how fusible web can be used for so much more than just applique. Consider adding color to it, use it to apply textile foil and metal leaf to fabric, create your own interfacing, use it to base your quilts and transfer shape outlines to the back of your fabric, so you don't have to reverse your appliqué patterns. With Sue's expert tips and techniques, you will discover how to create rich textured surfaces filled with wrinkles, tucks and creases.

Peabody Essex Museum, Fashion and Design Gallery September 28, 2019 to January 1, 2022

PEM's Fashion and Design gallery invites visitors to consider that we are designing creatures who continually manipulate, respond to, and mold our changing world. Ensembles from the Iris Apfel Rare Bird of Fashion collection celebrate the exuberant remixing and inventive styling of one of the world's most prominent fashion icons.

Vera Paints a Scarf: The Art and Design of Vera Neumann August 8, 2019 – January 26, 2020



Vera Paints a Scarf celebrates the work of artist Vera Neumann (1907-1993) and her contributions to the field of American design. Neumann was among the most successful female design entrepreneurs of the 20th century, and an originator of the American lifestyle brand. Over the course of her career, which spanned from her label's debut in 1942 to her death in 1993, Neumann produced an iconic line of women's scarves all signed with a cursive "Vera" and stamped with a ladybug, as well as thousands of textile patterns based on her drawings, paintings, and collages. This exhibition will be the first to comprehensively examine her career—and highlights the keys to her success: her joyful and inventive aesthetic, democratic design ethos, fusion of craft and mass production, and clever marketing. Telling the story of the artist behind the Vera brand, Vera Paints a Scarf offers a selection of paintings produced in Neumann's preferred technique, Japanese sumi-e (ink painting), from which her textile designs derive. The exhibition then continues with a broad exploration of her design work through over two hundred objects from her lines for the home and women's fashion produced between 1950 and 1980, including original works on paper, textiles and garments, archival photographs and video, as well as the ephemera related to the company's marketing campaigns, which ingeniously used the tagline "Vera paints" to promote her massmarket label.

Vera Paints a Scarf: The Art and Design of Vera Neumann is curated by Elissa Auther, MAD's Windgate Research and Collections Curator with the support of Curatorial Assistant Alida Jekabson. Additional support was provided by Rachael Schwabe and George Tiger Liu.
